8. DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

a. Report from Acting Treasurer – 2015 Year End Transfers

Several questions were asked by Council regarding the proposed transfers.

Councillor Cornelissen inquired if the \$80,000 for 218 Parkhill Main Street renovations was approved in the 2015 budget. Ms. Jonah verified that it was included in 2015.

The \$22,000 for electronic equipment was described as the AV equipment and to obtain a wireless microphone for the podium in the council chambers.

Mr. Nickles advised there is \$82,000 left over from the Ailsa Craig Park Project. The shade structure and some landscaping will need to be completed in the spring however he does not anticipate requiring the entire amount. It was suggested that \$30,000 – 40,000 may be needed.

A couple of projects have been carried over again as time has not permitted the completion of the projects. This includes \$25,000 for Bornish Road widening and \$70,000 for the River Road culvert.

MOTION #008/2016

d. Corporation of the Township of Madawaska Valley – Resolution endorsement regarding recruiting family physicians

MOTION #016/2016

NICHOL/MCLINCHEY: That the Council of the Municipality of North Middlesex supports the following motion from the Township of Madawaska Valley:

"Whereas Ontario's growing and aging population is putting an increasing strain on our publicly funded health care system;

And Whereas since February 2015, the Ontario government has made an almost 7 per cent unilateral cut to physician services expenditures which cover all the care doctors provide to patients-including cuts to programs which are specifically designed to act as incentives for physicians to practice in rural areas;

And whereas the decisions Ontario makes today will impact patients access to quality care in the years to come and these cuts will threaten access to the quality, patient-focused care Ontarians need and expect;

And whereas Ontario is experiencing a growing rural population as retires move to the countryside;

And whereas many rural municipalities in Ontario have formed physician recruitment and retention committees and strategies to deal with the reality of physician retirements and shortages;

And whereas rural areas in Ontario are already at a distinct disadvantage in recruiting family physicians due to a number of factors;

Now therefore be it resolved that, in an effort to retain and attract family physicians to our rural Ontario municipality, the Township of Madawaska Valley hereby requests that; the Minister of Health and Long Term Care reinstate incentives for physicians to practice in rural areas of Ontario; and that the Minister return to the table with Ontario's doctors and work together through mediation-arbitration to reach a fair deal that protects the quality, patient-focused care Ontario's families deserve,

And that copies of this resolution be sent to the Premier of Ontario, the County of Renfrew and all Renfrew County lower-tier municipalities, MPP John Yakabuski, Federal Minister of Health, Ontario College of Physicians and Surgeons and all municipalities in Ontario."

e. City of Kingston – Resolution endorsement regarding the development of a Basic Income Guarantee for all Canadians.

MOTION #017/2016

HEMMING/MCLINCHEY: That the Council of the Municipality of North Middlesex supports the following motion from the City of Kingston:

"Whereas the 2011 National Household survey confirmed that 14.9% of the population live in low income circumstances, a percentage exceeded in the City of Kingston where the percentage of the population living in poverty has been documented at 15.4%; and Whereas income insecurity and inequality continue to increase as a result of precarious employment; and

Whereas existing income security programs have not proved sufficient to ensure adequate, secure income for all; and

Whereas insufficient income, income insecurity and inequality have well-established, strong relationships to a range of adverse public health outcomes, and are root causes of many social ills such as illiteracy and short-fall of educational attainment, chronic stress, alienations, and criminal activity, all of which undermine the social fabric; and Whereas basic income guarantee would reduce income insufficiency, inequality and ensure everyone an income sufficient to meet basic needs and live in dignity regardless of work status; and

Whereas a basic income guarantee would provide an income floor for those doing socially essential but unpaid work, supporting the choices of those who engage in it; and Whereas a basic income guarantee would provide additional direct personal income which would be spent locally, thereby revitalizing local economies; and Whereas a basic income guarantee would enable individuals to pursue educational, occupational, social and wellness opportunities relevant to them and their families; and Whereas a basic income guarantee would support entrepreneurship and job transition for those trying to establish a new productive role for themselves in response to a persistently changing economy; and

Whereas a basic income guarantee would resemble income guarantees already provided in Canada for seniors guarantees which have contributed to health and quality of life improvements in this age group; and

Whereas basis income has been studied in Canada for approximately forty years and has demonstrated improved physical and mental health and educational outcomes; and Whereas a basic income guarantee program would involve the redistribution of the administration functions of existing income support programs to the nation as a whole and to senior government partners in the same manner as Medicare and the existing seniors and children's programs;

Therefore be it resolved that the City of Kingston endorse a national discussion of a basic income guarantee for all Canadians; and

That the City of Kingston encourage the provincial and federal governments through their respective responsible Ministers, including the Ontario Minister of Health and the Ontario Deputy Minister in charge of poverty reduction, to work together to consider, investigate, and develop a Basic Income Guarantee for all Canadians; and That this resolution be forwarded to all municipalities in Ontario with the request that they consider indicating their support for this most important initiative; and That this resolution be forwarded to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities, including the Big City Mayor's Caucus, with the request that they include proposing a Basic Income Guarantee in their respective engagements with the provincial and federal governments; and That copies of this resolution be shared with the Premier of Ontario, the Prime Minister of Canada, and all opposition leaders at both levels of government."

g. Municipality of Neebing – Resolution endorsement regarding public consultation relating to the Police Services Act.

MOTION #018/2016

HEMMING/ROPP: Be it resolved that the Council of the Municipality of North Middlesex supports the resolution from the Municipality of Neebing as follows:

"Whereas the Province has begun a process of public consultation relating to the Police Services Act:

And whereas the Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing continues to have significant concerns and objections to the amount of money that the Provincial Government expects Municipalities to pay for either having its own police service, for contracting with the Ontario Provincial Police, or for employing the Ontario Provincial Police through the "default" provisions of the Police Services Act;

And whereas the consultation statement issued by the Province indicates that the Province is seeking input on (among other matters) how to "clarify policies duties, modernize training programs and deliver services using a range of public safety personnel";

And whereas Ontario's provincial and municipal police forces are among the highest paid polices in Canada;

And whereas the residents of Canada deserve appropriate and affordable police protection:

Therefore be it resolved that the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing is urging all municipalities in Ontario, whether or not they have municipal police forces, to participate in the consultation process;

And further that the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing believes that effective community policing can be undertaken without the use of uniformed police officers through the use of a two tiered system that would allow municipalities to recruit non-uniformed safety personnel for day to day policing, relying on uniformed officers only for significant high-level criminal investigations andéor matters requiring particular expertise or specialized equipment;

And further that such a system would be delivering "services using a range of public safety personnel",

And further that such a system should allow Ontario's municipalities to utilize uniformed police services on a fee for service basis at the times when the services are required; And further that this would allow highly trained and specialized police officers to utilize their skills and abilities where required, focusing on high-order criminal activity; And further that this would save significant taxpayer dollars at both the municipal and provincial orders of government without causing an deterioration in public safety and protection;

And further that the Police Services Act should be amended to allow such a system to operate in Ontario;

And further that the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Neebing seeks support for this position from other Ontario municipalities."
